- Gods: Literary- Homeric Hymn to Demeter
- Heracles: Literary- Homeric Hymn to Heracles the Lion-Hearted, Virgil Aeneid, Ovid *Metamorphoses* 9.1-272. Visual- The Temple of Zeus at Olympia metopes
- Temples and Priests: Visual- Parthenon, Temple of Zeus at Olympia, Temple of Portunus, Pantheon
- Foundation stories: Literary- Livy, Plutarch. Visual- Theseus kylix
- Festivals: No prescribed sources. However, you will be expected to recognise Panathenaic amphorae and may be asked about the Saturnalia drawing from the Calendar of Philocalus (see page 95 of textbook).
- Symbols of Power: Visual- Parthenon (centauromachy metopes), Temple of Apollo at Bassae (centauromachy frieze) Augustus of Prima Porta Statue, Ara Pacis
- Death and Burial: No prescribed sources. However, you will be expected to recognise and explain the significance Greek funeral stele, Roman tombs and Roman sarcophagi. Examples of all three of these can be found on the revision PowerPoint.
- Journeying to the Underworld: Literary- Homeric Hymn to Demeter, Ovid Metamorphoses 10.1-64
